

## A Neighborhood History (Reprinted from a California Releaf Article by Michael Tanner)

In the early 1990s, traffic policy in the community of North Fair Oaks was coming to a literal dead end. This neighborhood of nearly 1,000 homes-located in an unincorporated area of San Mateo County and bordered by the cities of Menlo Park, Atherton, and Redwood City-had become part of a shortcut for heavy traffic from nearby U.S.101. The proposed solution was to cut off many streets at neighboring Atherton, leaving local residents landlocked.

## **Traffic-Calming with Trees**

"The big issue we were facing," says Art McClish, president of the Fair Oaks Beautification Association, was that passing drivers "were not seeing us as a neighborhood, but as a path to where they wanted to go." In response, he and a small group of neighbors got together to find ways to control traffic without having to close streets. Their solution was a series of 15- to 25- foot traffic circles at major residential intersections planted with oaks and shrubs, and smaller landscaped semicircles along side streets.

Not only is traffic under control now,"there are trees and bushes where there had just been asphalt," notes McClish. He says that neither goal—calming the traffic nor greening the streets—really preceded the other, but rather the two came together and made a good solution. The community had come together behind the project as well. McClish points out a typical intersection visible from his own house, where a traffic island is crowned by a stately oak and looked after by a neighbor who maintains it as a memorial to her husband.

#### A Place to Play

The small group of neighbors soon evolved into a non-profit organization, the Fair Oaks Beautification Association (FOBA). With the traffic circle project nearing completion, FOBA was able to turn its attention to other community needs. In 1998 the group began to work on a children's playground, with the goal of establishing a fun and safe play area within walking distance of every home in the neighborhood.

Completed in 2001, the North Fair Oaks Community Playground is a delightfully designed wedge of land complete with swings, a sandbox, picnic tables, and a pirate play ship structure. Located at the corner of Edison Way and Fair Oaks, the playground is built on land owned by the San Francisco Public Utilities Commission (PUC). A portion of the Hetch Hetchy aqueduct runs below ground through North Fair Oaks. The Public Utility Commission leases the land above the aqueduct at affordable rates for nonprofit groups.

With the paint barely dry on the new play equipment, FOBA began raising money for an endowment to cover ongoing maintenance and insurance expenses. Along with the continued fundraising effort, the group actively recruits "playground guardians" and organizes playground work days.
